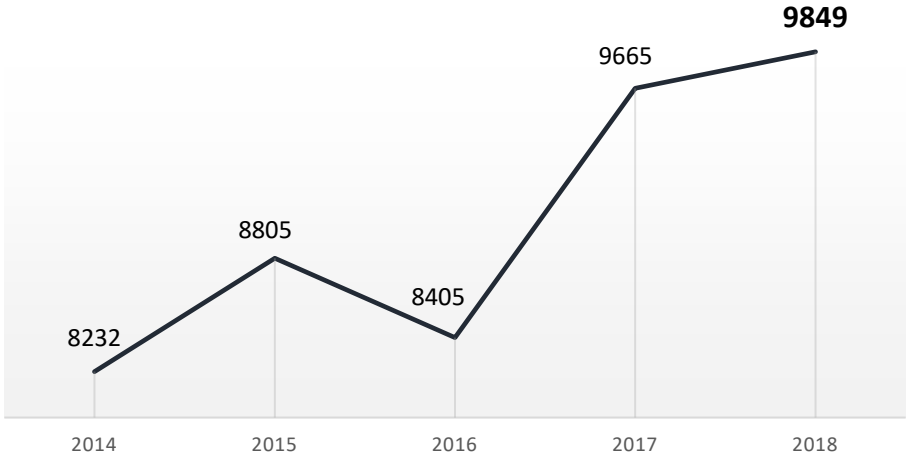

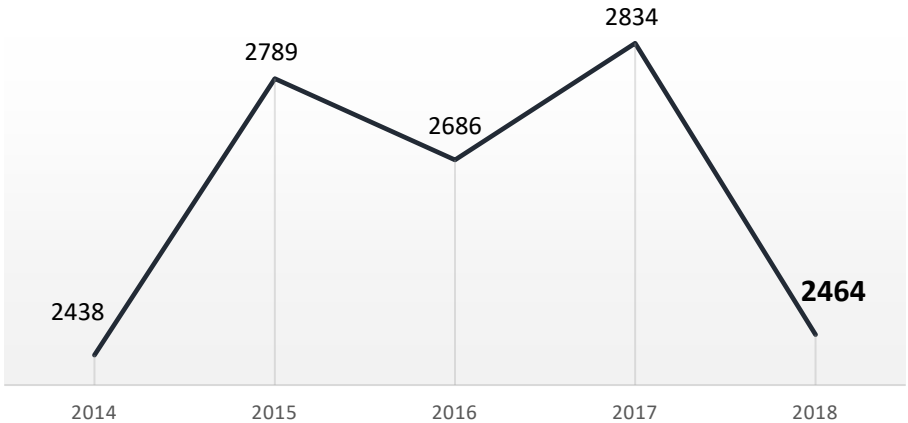

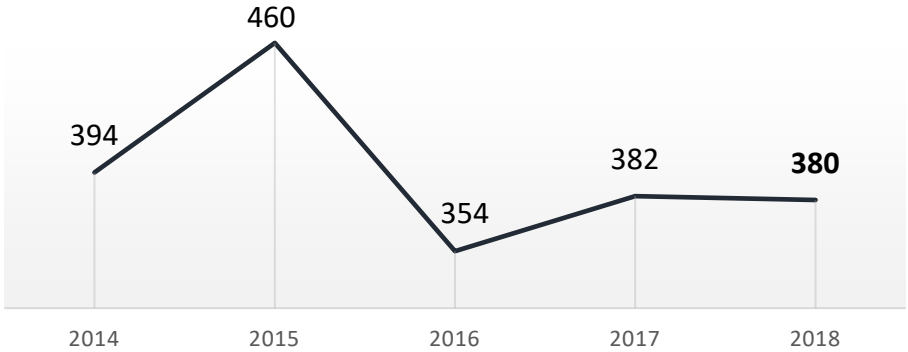

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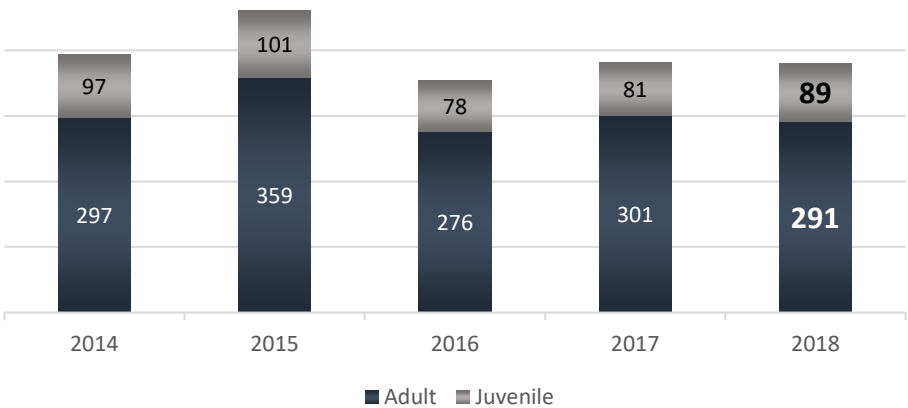
Arrests

An arrest consists of when criminal charges are filed on an individual; regardless if the individual was cited and released, served with a summons to appear in court, or physically arrested and booked into jail.



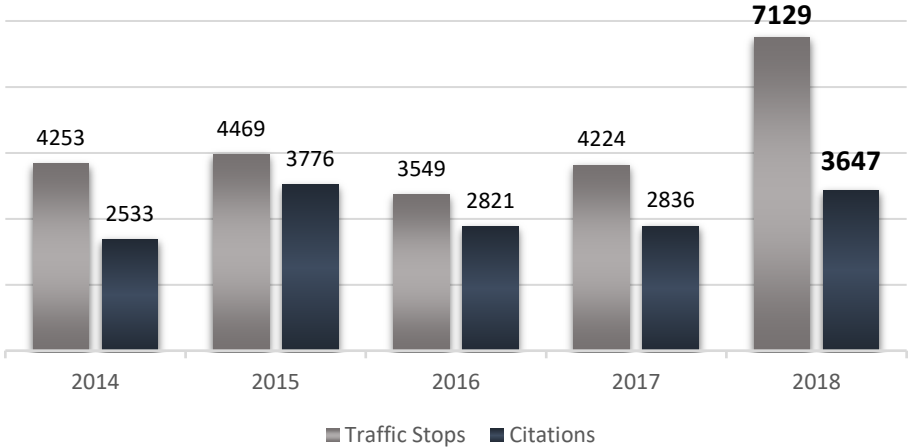
Arrest Demographics

The following chart shows a breakdown of the number of juvenile and adult arrests.



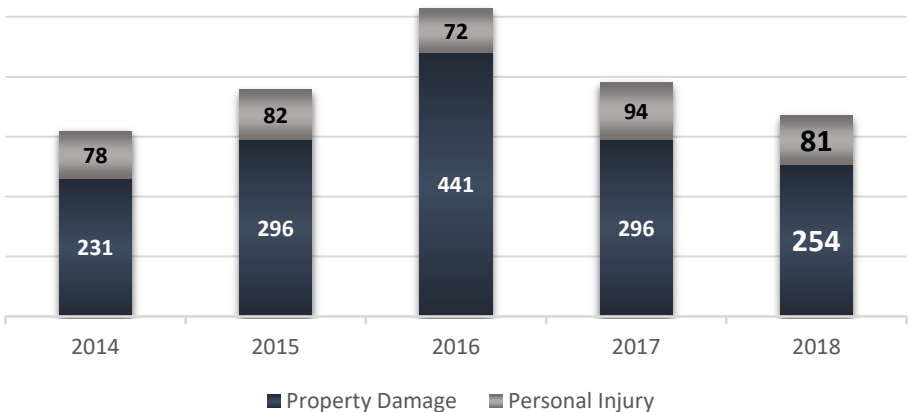

Traffic accidents are categorized as either property damage only or with personal injury to someone involved in the accident. The following statistics show the number of traffic accidents, categorized by accident type.

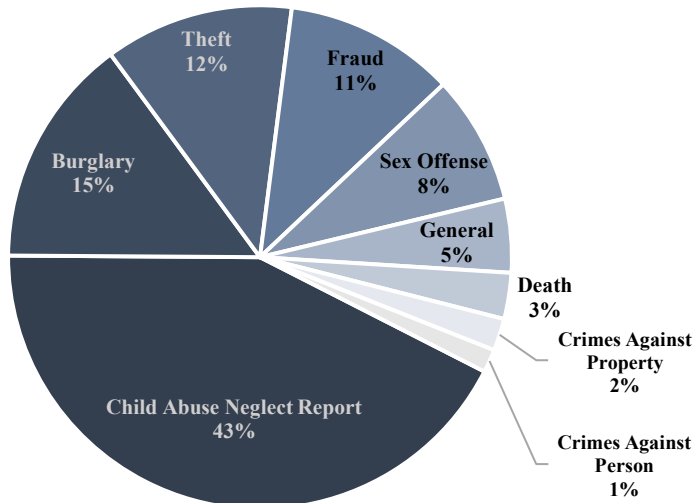


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Investigations Division

In 2018, the Investigations Division investigated 339 total cases, which was a 10% decrease from 2017. Below is a comparison between the number and types of cases that were investigated in 2017 and 2018. The pie chart shows the percentage of types of cases investigated.

Registered Sex Offenders

Registered sex offenders are required to register and provide information required by statute to the Department of Corrections or registering entity every six months. Offenders who are not under the supervision of AP&P must register with the Police Department or Sheriff's Office that has jurisdiction over the area where the offender resides.

The following is a breakdown of the different types of sex offender registrations in Kaysville City:

- 15 Active** (*offenders who still have a legal obligation to register with the State of Utah*)
- 2 Inactive – Other** (*offenders whose conviction is not registerable or reduced to a non-registerable offense*)
- 5 Inactive – Registration Expired** (*offenders who have been terminated from the registry*)
- 2 Pending** (*new offenders awaiting verification*)

In 2018, there were a total of 24 registered sex offenders residing in Kaysville City and detectives tracked 10* sex offenders with active registrations. Kaysville detectives conducted 16 sex offender registration compliance checks throughout the year.

**5 of the 15 active offenders were under the supervision of Adult Probation & Parole.*

Pharmaceutical Disposal Program

The Kaysville Police Department provides a disposal bin for the public to safely and confidentially dispose of their unwanted or expired medication. In the year 2018, the Kaysville Police Department destroyed 487.6 pounds of prescription drugs that were received in the pharmaceutical disposal bin.

Notable Events

Sesquicentennial Anniversary



2018 marked the 150th anniversary of the Kaysville Police Department, established in 1868. Officers wore sesquicentennial badges through the end of the year to commemorate this important milestone for Kaysville City and celebrate the history of the police department.

The officers came up with the concept of the badge design, which is a combination of the very first badge worn by Kaysville officers in 1868 and the current badge worn by officers today.

These sesquicentennial badges are a symbol of pride and privilege each and every member shares in being part of a department that has proudly served the citizens of Kaysville City for 150 years.

NAACP First Responders Award

On January 15, 2018, Chief Oberg was awarded the First Responders Award by the NAACP Salt Lake Branch at the 34th annual Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Luncheon.

The award recognizes recipients to “celebrate the men and women who serve our communities every day.”

Traffic Division

This year, the Kaysville Police Department implemented the newly formed Traffic Enforcement Division. The primary goal of the traffic program is to serve the community by enforcing motor vehicle traffic laws and facilitating the safe and expedient flow of vehicular and pedestrian traffic. The program also assists in traffic studies to keep the roadways of our community safe.



Our current traffic officer is Devan Rich, who has been busy in this new role. The majority of traffic enforcement is a direct response to community complaints regarding speeding and other traffic violations. Citizens are able to submit traffic complaints and requests for the radar board directly to him through the Kaysville City website.

The formation of this new program has made a substantial impact on the safety of our roads in the city. The number of traffic stops and citations have increased by 68.8% and 28.7%, respectively. The number of traffic accidents in 2018 decreased by 14.1% from the previous year.

Chevron Fire Incident



On April 5, 2018 police officers were dispatched to a suicide threat at the Chevron located at 320 West 200 North in Kaysville.

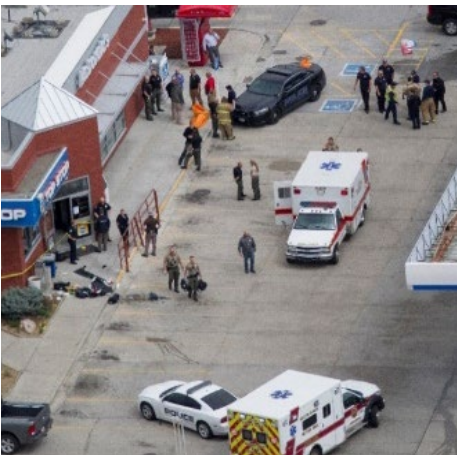
Dispatch reported that a man had poured gasoline on himself in the bathroom of the convenience store. Officers tried to restrain the male to get a lighter from his hand. The male then ignited the gasoline with the lighter.



Sgt. McKinnon and Officer Turner received minor burns and returned to full duty shortly after the incident.

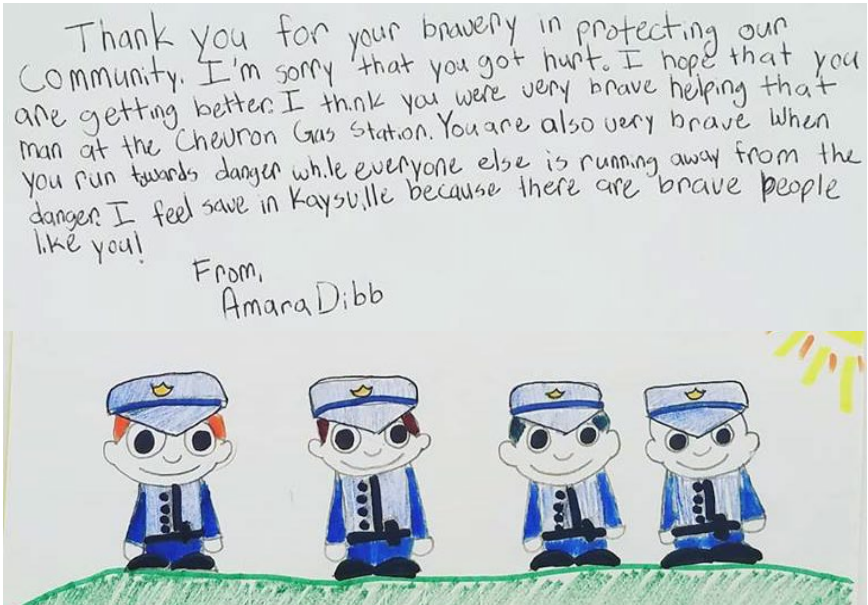
Officer Bradshaw received more severe burns and was in recovery for several weeks before returning to full duty.

Officer Jackson was admitted to the University of Utah Hospital Burn Unit and had to receive multiple skin graft surgeries. He was in recovery for 3 months before he could return to full duty.



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After the Chevron fire incident, we received an overwhelming outpouring of support and love. We are very fortunate and extremely proud to serve such a caring and supportive community whose response to tragedy is kindness and altruism.



University of Utah Burn Camp 5K



On April 28, 2018, members of the Kaysville Police Department proudly supported the University of Utah Burn Center by participating in their Burn Camp 5K at Barnes Park.

With the tragic Chevron incident faced by first responders on April 5, 2018, this 5K took on personal meaning for us this year. We had a great show of support from our first responder community, who were encouraged to run (or walk) in uniform.



Law Enforcement Torch Run



In May 2018, officers from the Kaysville Police Department proudly participated in the Davis County Law Enforcement Torch Run for Special Olympics.

The Torch Run was started in 1981 by Wichita, Kansas Police Chief Richard LaMunyon to involve local law enforcement personnel in the community and to support Special Olympics. Known as *Guardians of the Flame*, law enforcement members and Special Olympics athletes carry the “Flame of Hope” down the streets of their communities. The flame symbolizes courage and celebration of diversity uniting communities around the globe.



Officer Stanford Deployment

In May 2018, our D.A.R.E. officer, Justin Stanford, was deployed to Iraq as a Chaplain's Assistant with the Utah Army National Guard.

Officer Stanford is a Sergeant in the Utah Army National Guard and is also currently working on his degree to become a commissioned officer. The Kaysville Police Department proudly displays a Service Flag in the front office in honor of Officer Stanford's service.¹ We look forward to his return in 2019.



D.A.R.E.

During Officer Stanford's deployment, the D.A.R.E. program was cooperatively taught by Officer Martinez and Officer Turner to the 10 different elementary schools in Kaysville City for the 2018-2019 school year.

¹ The Service Flag of the United States is an official banner authorized by the Department of Defense for display by families and organizations to honor a member serving in the Armed Forces during any period of war or hostilities.

Law Enforcement Agency of the Year

In June 2018, Costco in South Ogden selected Kaysville Police Department as Law Enforcement Agency of the Year. They hosted a special law enforcement appreciation day, where Officer Jackson, Sergeant McKinnon, Officer Turner, and Officer Bradshaw were honored for their bravery during the Chevron fire incident in April.



Sergeant Promotion



In June 2018, Detective Michael Criddle was promoted to Sergeant.

Sergeant Criddle has been with the Kaysville Police Department since 2008. During this time, he has been a K-9 handler, an Agent with the Davis Metro Narcotics Strike Force, and spent one year as a detective in the Investigations Division. He is currently a Sergeant in the Patrol Division.

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Back the Blue Event

On June 28, 2018, community members organized a Back the Blue Kaysville Police Appreciation Day. The event, which was funded by citizen donations, allowed our officers and their families the rare opportunity to interact and build stronger relationships with our community while enjoying a great dinner and special activities.

The summer of 2018 was another busy year for *#copslovelemonadestands*, a social media campaign that is in its third year. The police department received daily requests for officers to stop by various lemonade stands throughout the city. The officers enjoyed supporting young entrepreneurs and building positive relationships with the children in our community. We look forward to continuing this fun community tradition each summer for years to come.



Larry H. Miller Tour of Utah

On August 9, 2018, Stage 3 of the Larry H. Miller Tour of Utah raced through Davis County. The race entered Kaysville at the north end of the city via Fairfield Road, travelled south on Fairfield Road to 200 North, east on 200 North to Highway 89 to the Bountiful area, then travelled back through Kaysville via the same route in reverse.

Kaysville police officers and city staff assisted with traffic control for this event and helped maintain the flow of traffic while the riders were in the south end of the county before their return to Kaysville. There were over 120 riders and 30 support vehicles involved in the race.

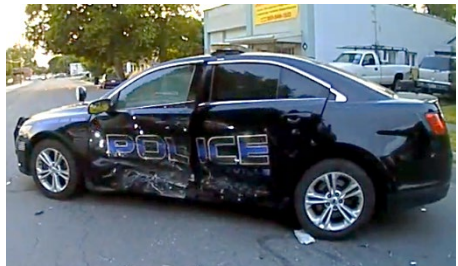
Officer Bartleson Incident



On August 29, 2018 Officer Bartleson was dispatched to a domestic call. During the investigation, the suspect left the scene in a vehicle.

As Officer Bartleson was driving through the area looking for the suspect a short time later, the suspect rammed his vehicle into the side of Officer Bartleson's patrol vehicle.

The suspect was taken to the hospital and later booked into jail. Officer Bartleson received injuries to his knee as a result of the incident but returned to duty shortly after.



9/11 Memorial Ruck



On September 11, 2018, Kaysville officers joined the Kaysville, Layton, and Hill Air Force Base Fire Departments in a 9/11 Memorial Ruck.

The event centered on honoring fallen first responders on and after 9/11. Attendees honored and remembered 9/11 with various short speeches and a moment of silence, before departing on a touch 9.1 mile ruck with three physical challenge stations.



New Officers

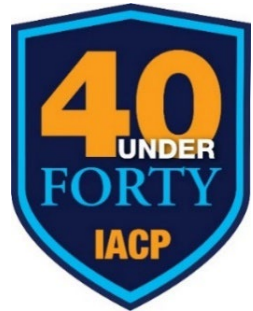
Officer Kiersten Shelley was a recent graduate from the police academy when she was hired by Kaysville.

Southern Police Institute 140th Administrative Officers Course



On November 9, 2018, Lieutenant Paul Thompson graduated from the Southern Police Institute's 140th Administrative Officers Course in Louisville, Kentucky.

The Southern Police Institute is part of the Department of Criminal Justice at the University of Louisville. It is an advanced educational and training institute whose mission is to enhance the professional development of law enforcement practitioners.

The course is a 12 week in-residence, accredited college-level educational leadership development program. Lt. Thompson represented the police department admirably and was well regarded by his peers and professors.

Officer Shelley Resignation



On November 20, 2018 Officer Kiersten Shelley was off duty and on a ride along with the Utah Highway Patrol.

At about 4 a.m., they responded to report of a crash involving a wrong-way driver on I-15 southbound near 5300 South. Officer Shelley was assisting the troopers by setting road flares when she was struck by another vehicle on the freeway that breached the accident enclosure. She was transported to the hospital with non-life threatening injuries. She suffered a concussion and injuries to her knee.



Officer's Shelley's knee injury required surgery with a recovery time of at least 6-8 months. Due to this, she resigned from the Kaysville Police Department on December 20, 2018. She was in the final stages of the Field Training Program.

New Officer

The Kaysville Police Department's newest officer, Rhett Farnell, graduated from the police academy in December 2018. He was sworn in at the City Council meeting on December 6, 2018.

Officer Farnell previously served four years as a Sergeant and combat engineer in the United States Marine Corps.

He is close to completing the Field Training Program and is a great new addition to our department.



Safewise Report 2018



Kaysville City was ranked the 9th safest city in Utah by the 2018 SafeWise report. The results are based on the most recent FBI crime report statistics and population data, narrowed down by the number of reported violent and property crimes in each city. They calculate the rate of crimes per 1,000 people in each city to directly compare the likelihood of these crimes occurring in cities with vastly different populations.

"We're pleased to see Utah doing a stellar job at keeping crime under control. Based on the most recent FBI crime report, the state's violent crime rate was 39% less than the U.S. average, with incidents of murder being especially low. Additionally, violent offenses accounted for a mere 3.9% of all crimes reported by the twenty safest cities in the Beehive State."

The SafeWise Report previously ranked Kaysville City as the 2nd safest city in 2015 and the #1 safest city in 2017.

Department Awards

Each year during National Police Week, the Kaysville Police Department hosts an annual awards banquet to celebrate the year's achievements and future perspectives. In 2018, the following awards were given to officers, whose actions were a great credit to themselves and the Kaysville Police Department.

Lifesaving Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Devan Rich for the lifesaving actions he took on January 4, 2017. While conducting a traffic stop, Officer Rich overheard a dispatched call to a medical emergency of a 5 year old who was not breathing, choking, and in full arrest.

Officer Rich ended the traffic stop and responded to the scene. He located the victim and immediately began performing lifesaving CPR measures. He was able to revive the subject, who was flown by medical helicopter to a hospital. Officer Rich's quick thinking and decisive actions saved the life of this person.

Lifesaving Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Daron Heslop for the lifesaving actions he took on January 31, 2017. While on routine patrol, Officer Heslop was dispatched to a medical emergency. Upon his arrival, he located a person who was not breathing and did not have a pulse.

He performed lifesaving CPR measures and was able to revive the subject, who was consequently transported to the hospital. Officer Heslop's quick thinking and decisive actions saved the life of this person.

Meritorious Service



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Michael Martinez for the apprehension of a burglary suspect, the recovery of stolen property, and the successful resolution of numerous theft cases.

On September 26, 2017, Officer Martinez responded to a 911 call related to a theft in progress. Though the suspect had fled the scene, Officer Martinez responded to the area, located the suspect, and arrested him.

Ultimately, the apprehension led to the recovery of nearly 100 stolen items, including a loaded handgun, and the successful resolution of numerous theft and burglary cases.

Chief's Star Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Mike Martinez for the courageous actions he took on November 19, 2017. Officer Martinez responded to hostage barricade call at a residence in North Salt Lake as part of a SWAT team activation. He was assigned to lead the rescue team to extract an adult female hostage and her two young children.

Officer Martinez and his team were able to conduct a successful clandestine extraction of all three hostages through a second story window with the use of a Bearcat armored vehicle. He and his team then participated in breaching the home, contacting the suspect, and ultimately apprehending him.

Officer Martinez's quick thinking and decisive actions likely saved the life of this family as well as that of the suspect.

Chief's Star Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Josh Steadman for the courageous actions he took on November 19, 2017. Officer Steadman responded to hostage barricade call at a residence in North Salt Lake as part of a SWAT team activation. He was assigned to the rescue team to extract an adult female hostage and her two young children.

Officer Steadman and his team were able to conduct a successful clandestine extraction of all three hostages through a second story window with the use of a Bearcat armored vehicle. He and his team then participated in breaching the home, contacting the suspect, and ultimately apprehending him.

Officer Steadman's quick thinking and decisive actions likely saved the life of this family as well as that of the suspect.

Distinguished Service Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Jessica Busk for the dedication exhibited in the performance of duties above and beyond the call of duty in 2017.

In 2017, Jessica Busk served as the only employee of the Records Division and at the same time discovered some significant issues with some of the department's records. She worked countless hours to resolve the issues in addition to her fulfilling her duties as the Support Services Supervisor as well as the records and evidence clerks.

Jessica successfully resolved these issues and performed these additional duties despite the new and increasing demands on her position.

Distinguished Service Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Detective Michael Moon for the dedication exhibited in the performance of duties above and beyond the call of duty.

In 2017, significant problems were identified with the police department's evidence room and processing procedures, which threatened the viability of hundreds of criminal cases. Detective Moon was assigned to resolve these issues. Ultimately, this required hundreds of hours of work, in addition to his ongoing investigative caseload.

Remarkably, this is the second time that Detective Moon has been called upon to fulfill this role, performing admirably on both occasions. Through dedication, Detective Moon restored the integrity of the evidence room and at the same time bolstered the Department's professionalism.

Lifesaving Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Lacy Turner for the lifesaving actions she took on January 15, 2018.

While off-duty in Syracuse, Officer Turner overheard a medical being dispatched in the area. Officer Turner arrived and located a vehicle that contained an unconscious female without a pulse.

Officer Turner pulled the female from the car and initiated CPR until medical personnel arrived. The following day, we were notified that the patient was alive because of Officer Turner's actions. Officer Turner's quick thinking and decisive actions saved the life of this person.
