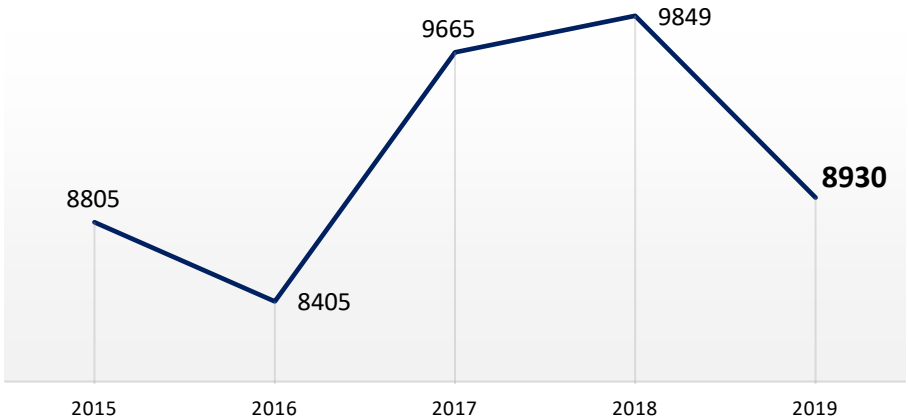

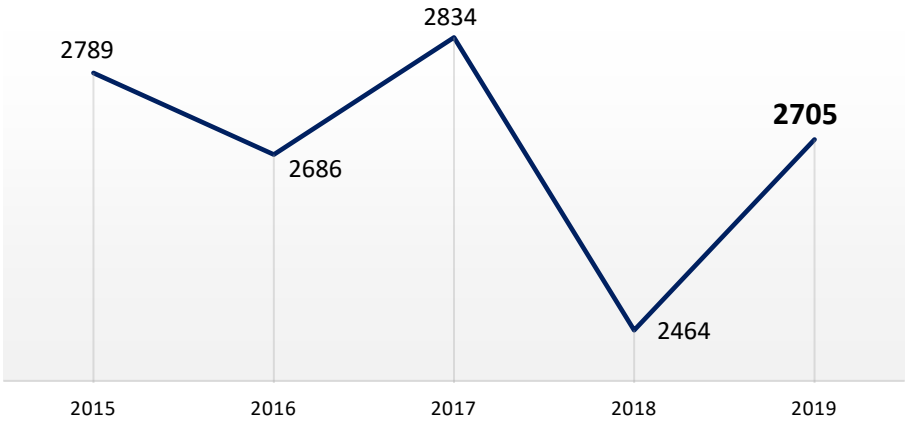

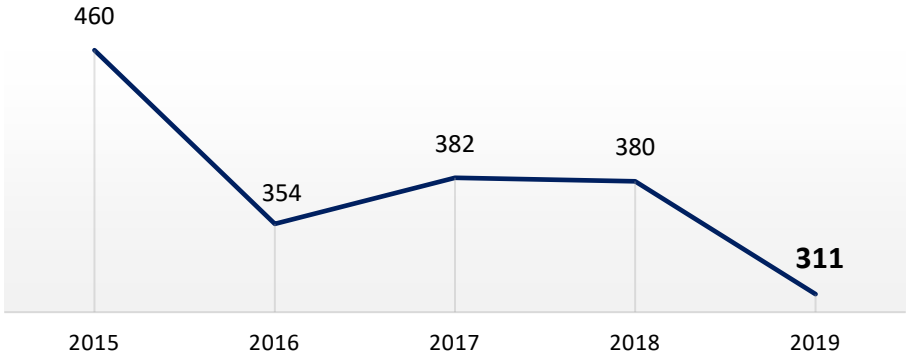

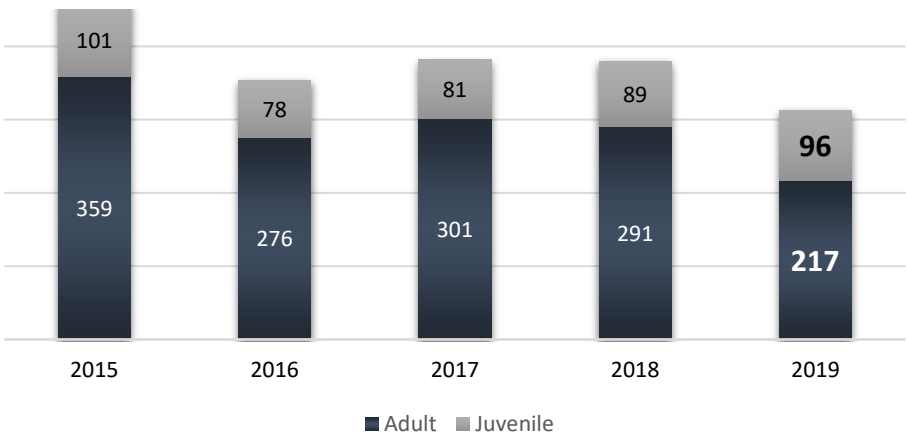
Arrests

An arrest consists of when criminal charges are filed on an individual; regardless if the individual was cited and released, served with a summons to appear in court, or physically arrested and booked into jail.



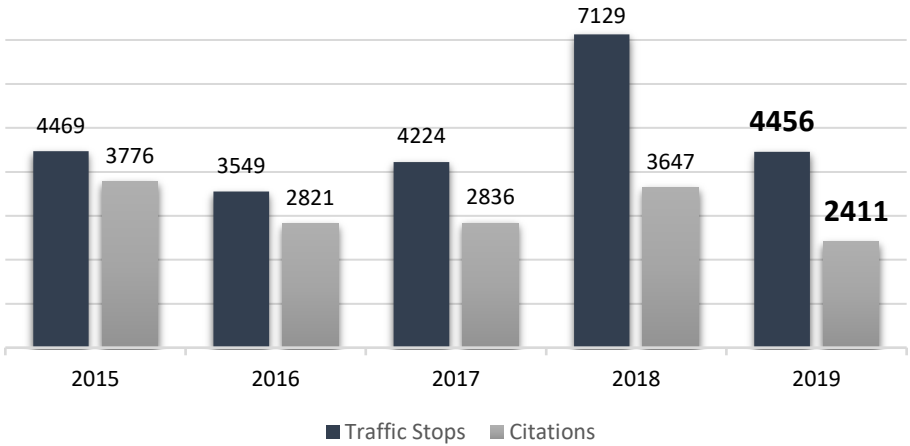
Arrest Demographics

The following chart shows a breakdown of the number of juvenile and adult arrests.



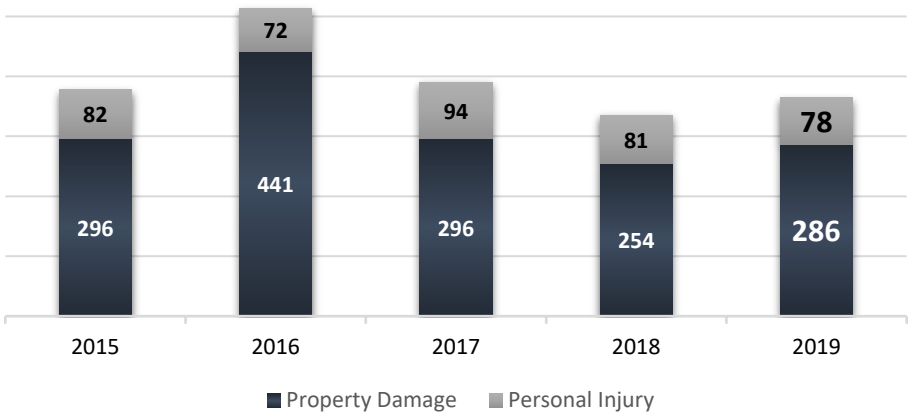

Traffic accidents are categorized as either property damage only or with personal injury to someone involved in the accident. The following statistics show the number of traffic accidents, categorized by accident

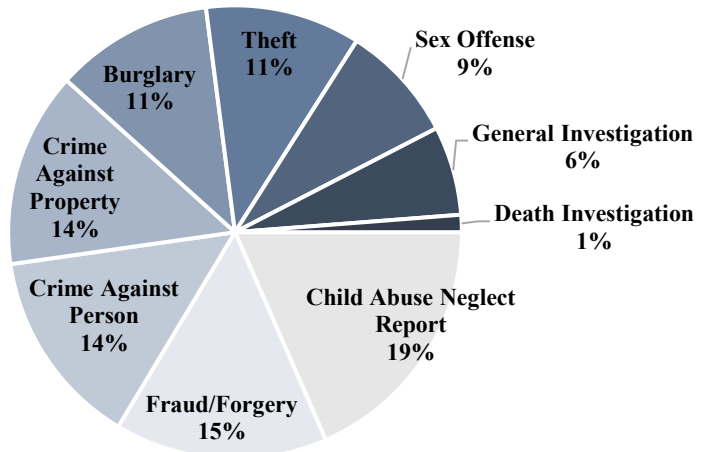


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Investigations Division

In 2019, the Investigations Division investigated 488 total cases, which was a 43.9% increase from 2018. Below is a comparison between the number and types of cases that were investigated in 2018 and 2019. The pie chart shows the percentage of types of cases investigated.

Registered Sex Offenders

Registered sex offenders are required to register and provide information required by statute to the Department of Corrections or registering entity every six months. Offenders who are not under the supervision of AP&P must register with the Police Department or Sheriff's Office that has jurisdiction over the area where the offender resides.

The following is a breakdown of the different types of sex offender registrations in Kaysville City:

- 13 Active** (*offenders who still have a legal obligation to register with the State of Utah*)
 - 1 Inactive – Other** (*offenders whose conviction is not registerable or reduced to a non-registerable offense*)
 - 3 Inactive – Registration Expired** (*offenders who have been terminated from the registry*)
 - 1 Pending** (*new offenders awaiting verification*)

In 2019, there were a total of 18 registered sex offenders residing in Kaysville City and detectives tracked 10* sex offenders with active registrations. Kaysville detectives conducted 15 sex offender registration compliance checks throughout the year.

**3 of the 13 active offenders were under the supervision of Adult Probation & Parole.*

Pharmaceutical Disposal Program

The Kaysville Police Department provides a disposal bin for the public to safely and confidentially dispose of their unwanted or expired medication.

In the year 2019, the Kaysville Police Department destroyed 583.60 pounds of prescription drugs that were received in the pharmaceutical disposal bin.

Notable Events

Lieutenant Pies Retirement



In January 2019, Lieutenant Kenton Pies retired from the police department after 26 years of dedicated service.

During his career, Lt. Pies served in and ultimately supervised both the Patrol and Investigations Divisions. He also spent time as a School Resource Officer and an agent with the Davis Metro Narcotics Strike Force. Lt. Pies is highly regarded for his dedication and service and was truly an asset to the

department.

Lieutenant Promotion

Following the retirement of Lt. Pies, Shawn McKinnon was promoted to Lieutenant in February 2019.

Lt. McKinnon has been with Kaysville City since 2012 and previously worked for the Tooele Police Department.

He was previously the Detective Sergeant of the Investigations Division and spent X years as a patrol Sergeant. He is currently the Lieutenant over the Patrol Division.



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Utah Peace Officers Association Medal of Valor

In 2019, Officers Bradshaw, Jackson, McKinnon, and Turner were recognized by two major law enforcement organizations for their courageous actions taken during the Chevron fire incident in April 2018.

In February 2019, they were awarded the Medal of Valor by the Utah Peace Officers Association.



In March 2019, the Utah Chiefs of Police Association awarded them with a Unit Citation and Officer of the Year.



Sergeant Promotion

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In March 2019, Officer Lacy Turner was promoted to Sergeant.

Sergeant Turner has been with the Kaysville Police Department since 2014. She previously worked for Woods Cross Police and Arvada Police Department in Colorado.

During her career, Sergeant Turner has been a School Resource Officer and with the Problem-Oriented Policing Unit.

She is currently a sergeant in the Patrol Division and is the first female Sergeant in the history of the Kaysville Police Department.

2019 Law Enforcement Hero Award

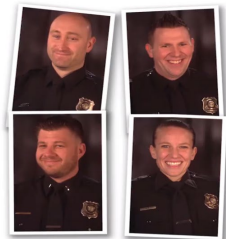

New Officers

American Red Cross

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In April 2019, Officer Jared Jensen joined our department from the Clinton Police Department. He had also previously worked for Sunset Police Department.

On May 3, 2019, two of our officers, Jake Seifert and Chase Ritter, graduated from the police academy.



These three new officers were sworn in at the City Council meeting on May 16, 2019. They are all great new additions to the police department.



K-9 Rex Retirement

In May 2019 a beloved member of the police department and community retired after a successful career in law enforcement. Nine year old K9 Rex has been with the department since 2012. During his 7 year career, he has conducted over 400 canine searches. After retirement, Rex will become a canine citizen and live with his handler Officer Matt Thurgood.



New K-9 Officer



In August 2019, Officer Colton Bartleson was selected as our newest K-9 Officer. Officer Bartleson and K-9 Rocky will attend the Utah Peace Officer Standards and Training K-9 Program to become certified in patrol and narcotics.

Each course is 8 weeks in duration, where training and certification standards are reality-based.

During the patrol certification, they are trained and taught on “capture” philosophies, such as find/bite and find/bark, as well as obedience/agility and criminal apprehension.

The training for narcotics certification channels the K-9’s natural drives so the K-9 perceives it is hunting simulated prey odors to detect illegal narcotics.

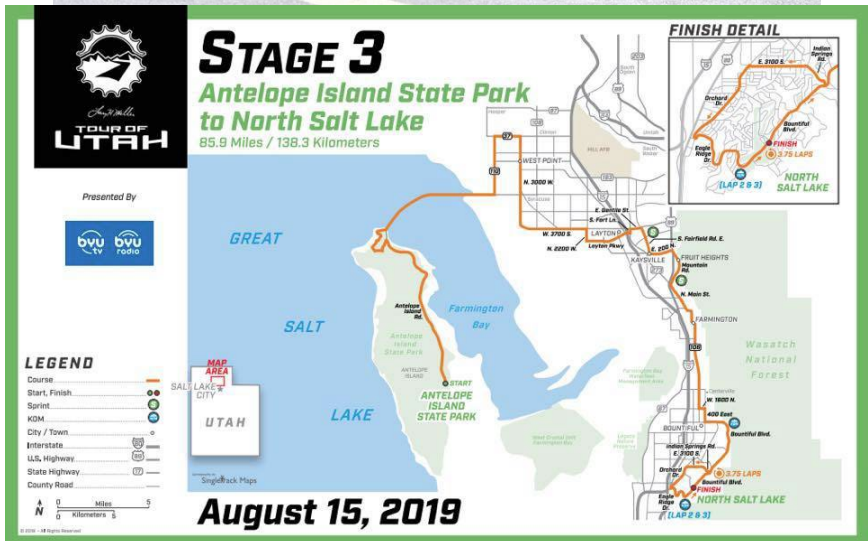


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Tour of Utah

On September 11, 2019, Hill Air Force Base Fire and Emergency Services, Kaysville Fire and Police, and Layton Fire and Police teamed up in honor of the 412 first responders who gave their lives to protect and serve on September 11, 2001.

This is the second year that several Kaysville officers have proudly participated in the 9.6 mile memorial ruck.



VirTra Training

In September 2019, the Kaysville Police Department began having all officers participate in the VirTra training at the Attorney General's office. VirTra helps prepare law enforcement officers for real-life incidents using scenario-based training.

The 300 degree simulator training goes over de-escalation, scenario awareness, critical thinking, communication skills, decision making under stress, reading body language, threat cues, judgmental use of force, firearms and public and officer safety.



No Shave Fundraiser



From October 1 through December 31, our officers participated in purchasing a beard permit. For \$20 a month, officers were allowed to grow their beards out of policy.

Each year, Kaysville Police selects a charity to donate the funds to. This year, we chose to support one of our own and all funds went towards a Kaysville officer in paying off their child's cancer treatments.

Victim Advocate Spotlight

In October 2019, KUTV2 did a spotlight story on our victim advocate, Jennifer Winchester, who had recently attended an FBI training program for victims of violent crimes.

Jennifer's two year grant-funded position is the first of its kind for Davis County. She accompanies programs to interviews, keeps them apprised of the investigation and court hearings, and connects them to third party services.



Trunk or Treat



On October 30, 2019, the Kaysville Police Department hosted its third annual Trunk or Treat event in the parking lot of the police station. This has become such a popular event with the community that we run out of candy every year.



Law Enforcement Impact Award

FOP Officer of the Year



On December 3, 2019, Detective Isaacson was awarded the Fraternal Order of Police Officer of the Year award. Detective Isaacson received this award after being nominated for her amazing service.

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New Officers



In December 2019, the Kaysville Police Department hired two new veteran officers, Bret Bateman and Dustin Ballard.

Officer Bateman started his career as a deputy in the Cache County Jail. He previously worked for two years at Sunset Police Department and three years at the Clinton Police Department before being hired by Kaysville.

Officer Ballard was in the U.S. Air Force for 7.5 years, with two deployments to Iraq. He worked at Farmington Police Department for five years in patrol and as a School Resource Officer before being hired by Kaysville. He also has a Bachelor's degree in criminal justice and a Master's degree in leadership.

Safewise Report 2019



Kaysville City was ranked the 6th safest city in Utah by the 2019 SafeWise report, making the list for the third year in a row. The SafeWise Report previously ranked Kaysville City as the #1 safest city in 2017 and the 9th safest city in 2018.

The results are based on the most recent FBI crime report statistics and population data, narrowed down by the number of reported violent and property crimes in each city. They calculate the rate of crimes per 1,000 people in each city to directly compare the likelihood of these crimes occurring in cities with vastly different populations.

Below is an excerpt from the Utah's 20 Safest Cities of 2019 Report:

"The Beehive State is abuzz with good news when it comes to violent crime—the state's overall violent crime rate of 2.55 incidents per 1,000 is almost half the national rate of 4.49. And although none of our safest cities reported zero violent crimes, 65% of them saw fewer than 20 total.

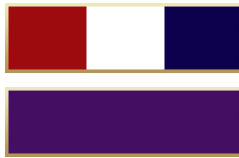
Utah doesn't do as well when it comes to property crime, though. In addition to being home to the second-worst metro area for porch piracy (package theft), the state's overall property crime rate is 29.46—more than two points higher than the national rate of 27.11. If you live in one of our safest cities, though, you can relax. Each of the cities on our list reported no more than 25.63 property crimes per 1,000."

Medal of Valor & Purple Heart



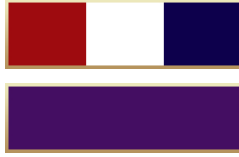
The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Cade Bradshaw for the brave and heroic actions he took on April 5, 2018.

At the end of his shift, Officer Bradshaw responded to a suicidal subject call. Upon his arrival, he located a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside of a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Officer Bradshaw attempted to deescalate the situation while bystanders were being evacuated.

Concerned for the subject and bystanders' safety, Officer Bradshaw attempted to subdue the subject. In the struggle, Officer Bradshaw and the subject were severely burned, but transported to the hospital.

Officer Bradshaw risked his life to protect the suicidal subject and the innocent bystanders in the area.

Medal of Valor & Purple Heart



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Robert Jackson for the brave and heroic actions he took on April 5, 2018.

While on routine patrol, Officer Jackson was dispatched to a suicidal subject. Upon his arrival, he located a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside of a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Officer Jackson attempted to deescalate the situation while bystanders were being evacuated.

Concerned for the subject and bystanders' safety, Officer Jackson attempted to swat the lighter out of the subject's hand and subdue him. In the struggle, Officer Jackson and the subject were severely burned, but transported to the hospital.

Officer Jackson risked his life to protect the suicidal subject and the innocent bystanders in the area.

Medal of Valor



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Sergeant McKinnon for the lifesaving actions he took on April 5, 2018.

Sergeant McKinnon responded to a suicidal subject call. Upon his arrival, he located a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside of a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Sergeant McKinnon attempted to deescalate the situation while bystanders were being evacuated. Concerned for the subject and bystanders' safety, Sergeant McKinnon ultimately attempted to subdue the subject. In the struggle, responding officers and the subject were severely burned. Sergeant McKinnon extinguished the fire on the subject and coordinated a medical response.

Sergeant McKinnon risked his life to protect the suicidal subject and the innocent bystanders in the area.

Medal of Valor



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Lacy Turner for the lifesaving actions she took on April 5, 2018.

While on routine patrol, Officer Turner was dispatched to a suicidal subject. Upon her arrival, she located a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Officer Turner attempted to deescalate the situation while bystanders were being evacuated. Concerned for the subject and bystanders' safety, Officer Turner ultimately attempted to subdue the subject. In the struggle, responding officers and the subject were severely burned. Officer Turner stayed with Officer Jackson and reassured him until he was medically evacuated.

Officer Turner risked her life to protect the suicidal subject and the innocent bystanders in the area.

Kaysville officers responded to a suicidal subject call. Upon their arrival, they located a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside of a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Officers attempted to deescalate the situation while bystanders were being evacuated.

Concerned for the subject and bystanders' safety, officers attempted to swat the lighter out of the subject's hand and subdue him. In the struggle, Officer Bradshaw, Officer Jackson, and the subject were severely burned. Officers extinguished the flames off Officer Jackson and the subject. The officers and subject were treated and transported to the hospital.

Responding officers risked their lives and their health to help each other, the suicidal subject, and the innocent bystanders.

Distinguished Service Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Detective Michael Moon for the actions he took on April 5, 2018.

Kaysville officers responded to a suicidal subject call of a man who had doused himself in gasoline inside of a convenience store, threatening to light himself on fire. Ultimately, the subject lit himself on fire, along with some responding officers and a portion of the structure.

Detective Moon, who responded to the call, was tasked with investigating the case. Detective Moon coordinated this investigation involving multiple agencies, several disciplines, and dozens of officers.

Lifesaving Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Colton Bartleson for the lifesaving actions he took on July 29, 2018. While on routine patrol, Officer Bartleson was dispatched to a medical emergency. Upon his arrival, he located a person who was not breathing and did not have a pulse.

Officer Bartleson performed lifesaving CPR measures and was able to revive the subject, who was subsequently transported to a hospital.

Officer Bartleson's quick thinking and decisive actions saved the life of this person.

Chief's Star Award



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Colton Bartleson for the courageous actions he took on August 29, 2018. While on routine patrol, Officer Bartleson was dispatched to a domestic disturbance. Upon his arrival, the suspect fled the scene.

Officer Bartleson attempted to locate the suspect, and while doing so, was violently struck by the suspect's vehicle. Officer Bartleson was able to exit his own vehicle and successfully subdue the suspect, despite the collision, his injury, and the suspect's resistance.

Officer Bartleson's quick thinking and decisive actions ensured the public's safety.

Officer of the Year Award

The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Crystal Isaacson for exemplary service throughout 2018.

In her second year as an officer, Officer Isaacson initiated 1,076 traffic stops and issued 653 citations for 939 violations. She also handled 1,041 calls for service and investigated most of her cases to completion.

The quality of her work was not only impressive but extraordinary. Remarkably, she received many accolades for her performance without any sustained citizen complaints.
