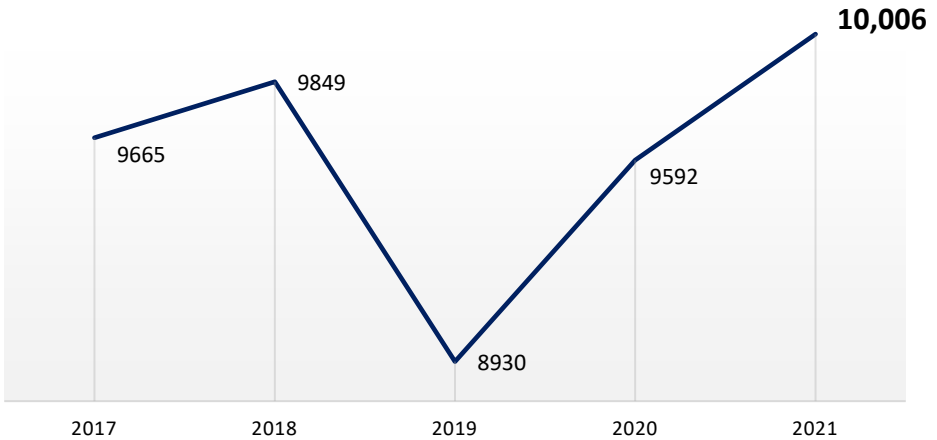

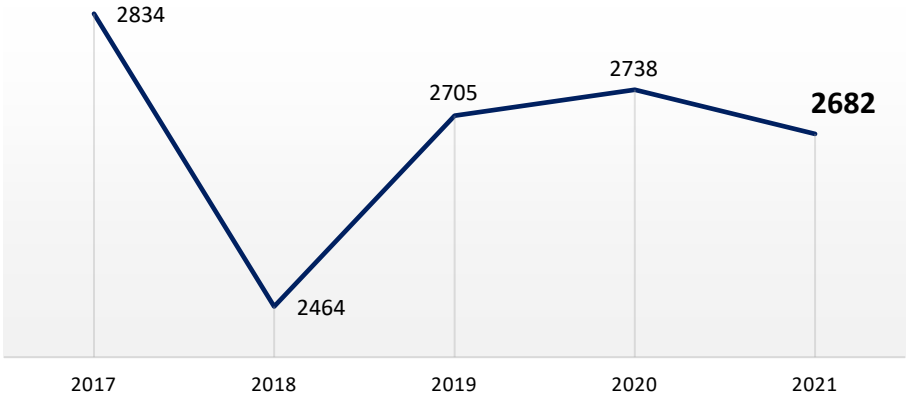

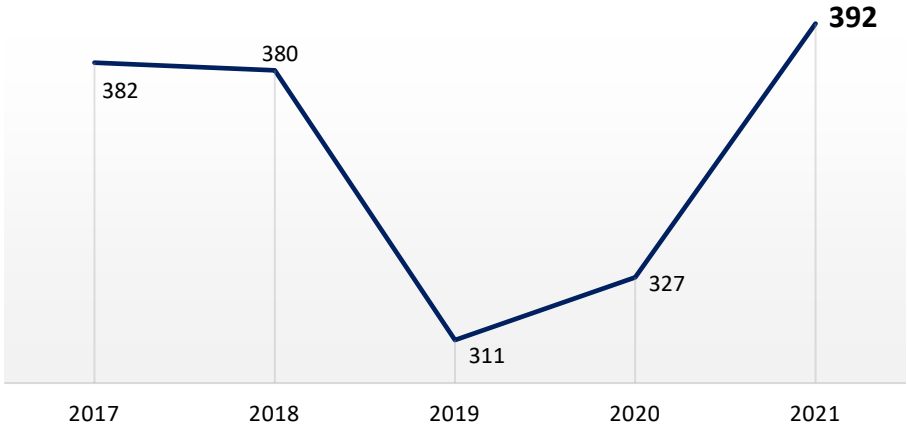

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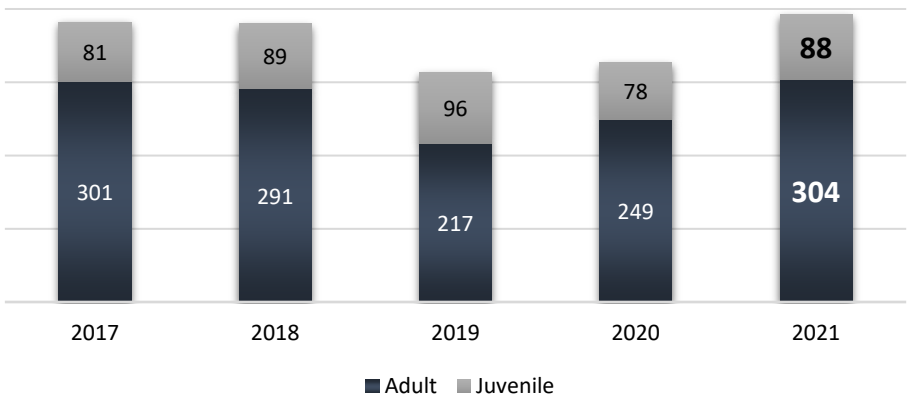
Arrests

An arrest consists of when criminal charges are filed on an individual; regardless if the individual was cited and released, served with a summons to appear in court, or physically arrested and booked into jail.



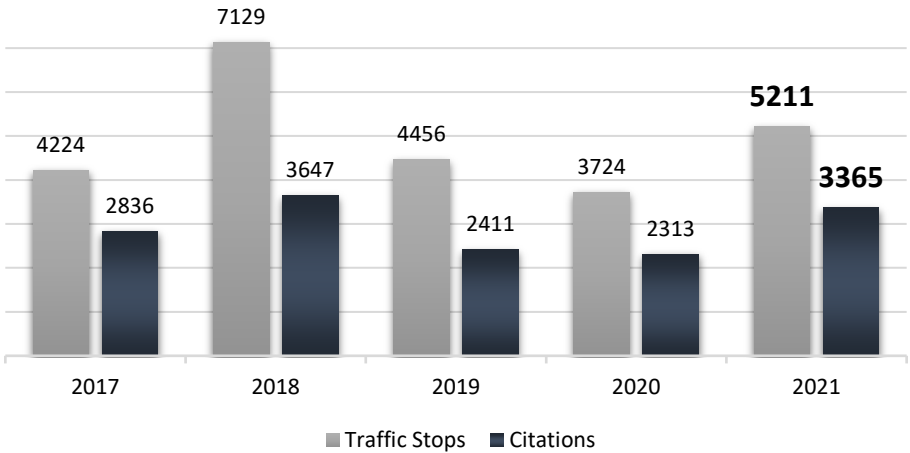
Arrest Demographics

The following chart shows a breakdown of the number of juvenile and adult arrests.



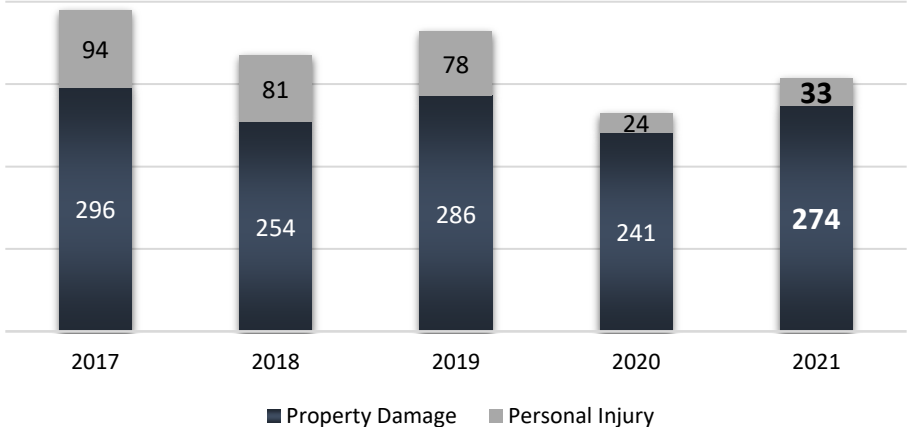

Traffic accidents are categorized as either property damage only or with personal injury to someone involved in the accident. The following statistics show the number of traffic accidents, categorized by accident type.

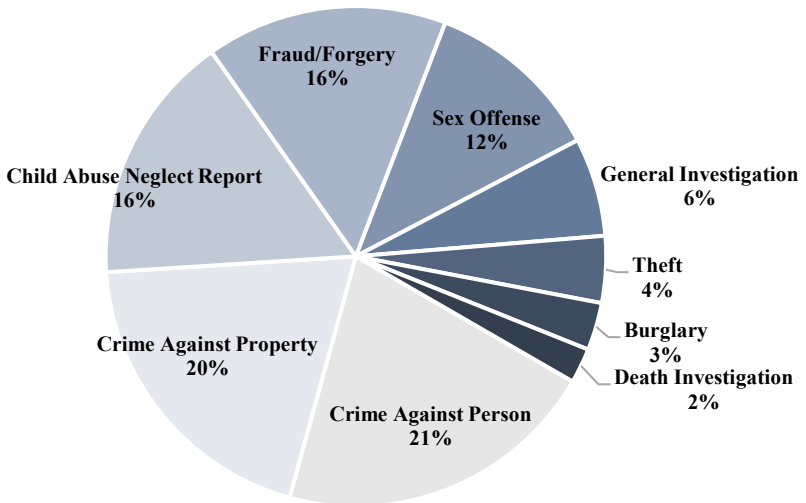


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Investigations Division

Registered Sex Offenders

Registered sex offenders are required to register and provide information required by statute to the Department of Corrections or registering entity every six months. Offenders who are not under the supervision of AP&P must register with the Police Department or Sheriff's Office that has jurisdiction over the area where the offender resides.

The following is a breakdown of the different types of sex offender registrations in Kaysville City:

13 Active

Offenders who still have a legal obligation to register with the State of Utah

1 Inactive – Other

Offenders whose conviction is not registerable or reduced to a non-registerable offense

3 Inactive – Registration Expired

Offenders who have been terminated from the registry

1 Inactive – Deceased

2 Pending

New offenders awaiting verification

In 2021, there were a total of 20 registered sex offenders residing in Kaysville City and detectives tracked 13 sex offenders with active registrations. Kaysville detectives conducted 26 sex offender registration compliance checks throughout the year.

In the year 2021, the Kaysville Police Department destroyed 456.40 pounds of prescription drugs that were received in the pharmaceutical disposal bin.

Notable Events

2020 FOP Officer of the Year Award



In January 2021, Detective Steadman was the recipient of the 2020 FOP Officer of the Year Award.

Detective Steadman served as the first Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) detective for the department. He also serves as a firearms instructor and SWAT operator.

Therapy Dog

In January 2021, our victim advocate, Jennifer Winchester, was able to obtain grant funding for a therapy dog. Walter is an English retriever and works side-by-side with our victim advocate to provide assistance to victims.

Walter successfully completed a therapy dog training program to obtain his Service Dog certification.



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Jason W. Read Protect and Serve Foundation Donation

In February 2021, the Jason W. Read Protect and Serve Foundation donated \$2,000 to the police department. We are so grateful for their generous donation, which was used to purchase equipment for the department.



Together We Rise for Unity with Law Enforcement



On February 25, 2021 Chief Oberg was interviewed for the Good Cause Foundation's *Together We Rise for Unity with Law Enforcement*.

Together We Rise is a group of Kaysville residents building unity in diversity within the community. Residents from different backgrounds come together to create a platform where learning and growth surrounding the topics of racial unity and social awareness can be discussed in a positive, respectful environment.

New Officers

Kaysville Police Department hired three new officers in the spring and summer of 2021.

Officer Joshua Delos Santos graduated from the police academy on April 15, 2021.

He was sworn in at the City Council meeting on May 6, 2021.



In June 2021, Officer Ricardo Lozano joined the department from Fox Valley Metro Police Department in Little Chute, Wisconsin.

In July 2021, Officer Travis Collings joined the department from the Clearfield Police Department.

Officers Lozano and Collings were both sworn in at the City Council meeting on July 19, 2021.

All three of our newest officers successfully completed their field training programs and are great new additions to the department.

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#copsandlemonade Challenge

Each summer, Kaysville officers look forward to lemonade stand season. This year, we extended the Cops and Lemonade challenge to all law enforcement agencies. Agencies received one point for every post and bonus points for each additional officer in the picture. The challenge was a huge success and participants included Bountiful PD, Harrisville PD, Lone Peak PD, North Salt Lake PD, Salt Lake City PD, South Ogden PD, Weber State PD, West Bountiful PD, Woods Cross PD, Summit County Sheriff, and Weber County Sheriff. Kaysville Police won the challenge with Bountiful PD coming in at a close second.



Public Safety Therapist



In September 2021, the Kaysville Police Department hired Stuart Palmer as a full-time public safety therapist.

Stuart retired from the West Valley Police Department in 2017 and graduated from the University of Utah in 2018 with a master's degree in social work. He is certified in Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavior Therapy, Dialectical Behavior Therapy, Eye

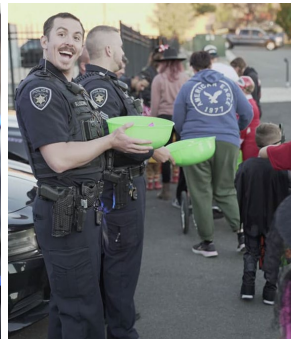
Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing, and Accelerated Resolution Therapy, which are all modalities used for trauma.

Safewise Report 2021



Kaysville City was ranked the 3rd safest city in Utah by the 2021 SafeWise report, making the list for the fifth year in a row. The SafeWise Report previously ranked Kaysville City as the #1 safest city in 2017, the 9th safest city in 2018, 6th safest in 2019, and 3rd safest in 2020.

The results are based on the most recent FBI crime report statistics and population data, narrowed down by the number of reported violent and property crimes in each city. They calculate the rate of crimes per 1,000 people in each city to directly compare the likelihood of these crimes occurring in cities with vastly different populations.

Below is an excerpt from the Utah's 20 Safest Cities of 2021 Report:

"Utah is less concerned overall about crime and safety than most of the country, with the least-worrisome issues being gun violence and the pandemic. Chances are people who live in one of Utah's 10 safest cities have even less to worry about, especially when it comes to violent and property crime."

Certificate of Merit

Jared Jensen



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Jared Jensen for the apprehension of a suspect committing a strong-arm robbery and assault.

On April 5, 2020, Officers Jensen and Embley responded to a robbery call, where a convenience store employee had been assaulted and robbed. With the assistance of Utah Highway Patrol, they were able to locate the suspect behind a nearby business.

Officers Jensen and Embley were able to apprehend and arrest the suspect, who actively resisted and assaulted officers.

On July 14, 2020, Officer Benson responded to an attempt to locate for a stolen vehicle while the on-duty patrol officers were busy with other calls. While checking the area, Officer Benson located the stolen vehicle and suspect, which

she apprehended with a felony stop.

A subsequent investigation revealed the suspect had stolen the vehicle, along with two others that he lit on fire.

Through their investigation, they were able to determine the vehicle, the attached trailer, and a handgun located within the vehicle had been stolen. They were able to arrest the suspect and ultimately identify him as a federal probationer with several outstanding arrest warrants.

The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Bret Bateman for his lifesaving actions on October 17, 2020.

While on routine patrol, Officer Bateman was dispatched to a suspicious circumstance. Upon his arrival, he located a suicidal juvenile who attempted to jump off the overpass onto the freeway below.

Officers Bateman and Turner were able to physically subdue the juvenile despite his active resistance and pleas to be shot. Through their efforts, the juvenile was transported to the hospital and treated.

The Kaysville Police Department recognized Officer Lacy Turner for her lifesaving actions on October 17, 2020.

While on routine patrol, Sergeant Turner was dispatched to a suspicious circumstance. Upon her arrival, she located a suicidal juvenile who attempted to jump off the overpass onto the freeway below.

Officers Turner and Bateman were able to physically subdue the juvenile despite his active resistance and pleas to be shot. Through their efforts, the juvenile was transported to the hospital and treated.



Chief's Star Award



Paul Thompson



The Kaysville Police Department recognized Paul Thompson for his successful investigation into the allegations that the spouse of a Kaysville police officer posted racist comments online, in the midst of riots and civil unrest over racial tensions with law enforcement.

On May 28, 2020, Lieutenant Thompson was tasked with conducting an internal affairs investigation into racial posts while the FBI was asked to conduct a separate investigation. Through his investigation, Lieutenant Thompson was able to provide the FBI investigator with valuable information that ultimately helped to obtain enough evidence to criminally charge the suspect and clear the Kaysville officer's name.

Through his actions, Lieutenant Thompson was able to help restore the victim's reputation as well as that of the entire Kaysville Police Department.

Leadership Award

Sol Oberg



The members of the Kaysville Police Department recognized Chief Sol Oberg for his superior leadership and dedicated professionalism throughout 2020.

Chief Oberg successfully navigated the police department through an unprecedented worldwide pandemic without limiting our quality of response to our community. He proactively implemented safety procedures and protocols, providing the department with proper safety supplies and PPE during a nationwide shortage, and kept the community informed of important updates and mandates.

In the summer of 2020, high profile police encounters sparked local outrage, riots, and calls to defund police. Chief Oberg prioritized the safety of Kaysville by obtaining specialized equipment, ensuring increased staffing for the city, and providing support for outside agencies as needed and when available.

As a whole, 2020 took its toll on members of the police department. As a way to increase morale, recruitment, retention, and quality of service, Chief Oberg successfully advocated an increased and specialized compensation plan for department members. Chief Oberg exhibited exceptional leadership during various challenging situations throughout 2020; ensuring the safety and wellbeing of the public as well as department members.

Employee of the Year Award

Jennifer Winchester

The Kaysville Police Department recognized Victim Advocate Jennifer Winchester for exemplary service throughout 2020.

Jennifer Winchester is the police department's victim advocate. In this role, she has built a strong foundation for victim advocacy, and contributed positively to investigative effectiveness and officer wellness.



In 2020, Jennifer led the change to trauma-informed interviews through departmental training, protocols, and interview room remodels. She also implemented the department's first crisis response canine program to provide comfort to victims and the department's officers. In addition to the victim advocate program grant and the VAWA investigator grant, she helped administer grants to implement the trauma-informed interview protocols and crisis response canine program.
